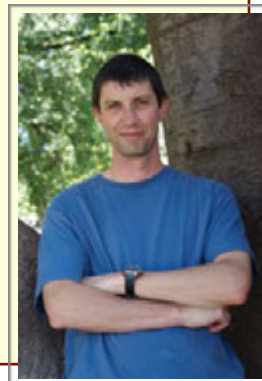

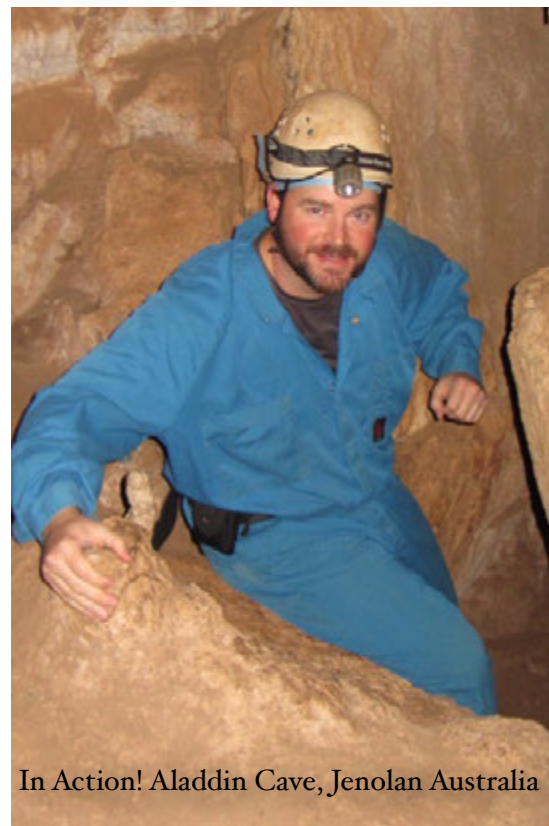

UIS CELEBRATES FIFTY YEARS

In June 2015 at Postojna Cave, Slovenia, the International Union of Speleology celebrated 50 years as an organisation. UIS was founded in 1965 at Postojna during the 4th International Congress of Speleology and has subsequently grown to include over 60 member countries located on all continents of the world.

ISCA is often regarded as a 'child' of UIS, having been formed from within this organisation. However, as Vice President Oedl stated during the commemorative ceremony inside Postojna Cave, this 'child' will be 25 years old in November and as such ISCA hopes to be able to go hand and hand into the future with UIS and ISCA working collaboratively and productively.

President of UIS, Kyung Sik Woo, visited Eisriesenwelt Cave following the Postojna ceremony and confirmed again with Vice President Oedl the importance of the relationships between our two organisations. With UNESCO looking to make 2021 the official year of Caves and Karst, it is certain that we have much reason to continue this fine partnership into the future.

VALE PROFESSOR ELERY HAMILTON-SMITH

The International caves community is poorer following the recent passing of legendary caver and environmental conservation advocate Elery Hamilton-Smith who died peacefully in Melbourne on June 27th 2015 aged 85. An inspirational speaker and provocative intellectual, Elery dedicated his life to the better understanding of caves and karst areas and to their protection. He co-authored the IUCN Guidelines for Cave and Karst Management as well as numerous papers on both the science of cave management and the social framework of show cave tourism and operation. He was regarded as the 'father' of the Australasian Cave and Karst Management Association (ACKMA), a leading contributor to the Australian Speleological Federation and to the Australasian Bat Society and was a member of the Order of Australia.

Elery was a gentleman and a scholar of the highest order. A tremendous friend and mentor, he was always generous in sharing his great knowledge and in encouraging the new generation of caves and cave managers to think deeply and to always question the concept of 'best practice'.

In mourning his passing, the innumerable tributes that have flooded in from all over the world to Elery make it very clear just how rich his life was, how many individuals he has touched and influenced and just what a tremendous legacy he leaves behind.

BELIANSKA CAVE, SLOVAKIA - AN OLD CAVE WITH A NEW LOOK AND FEEL

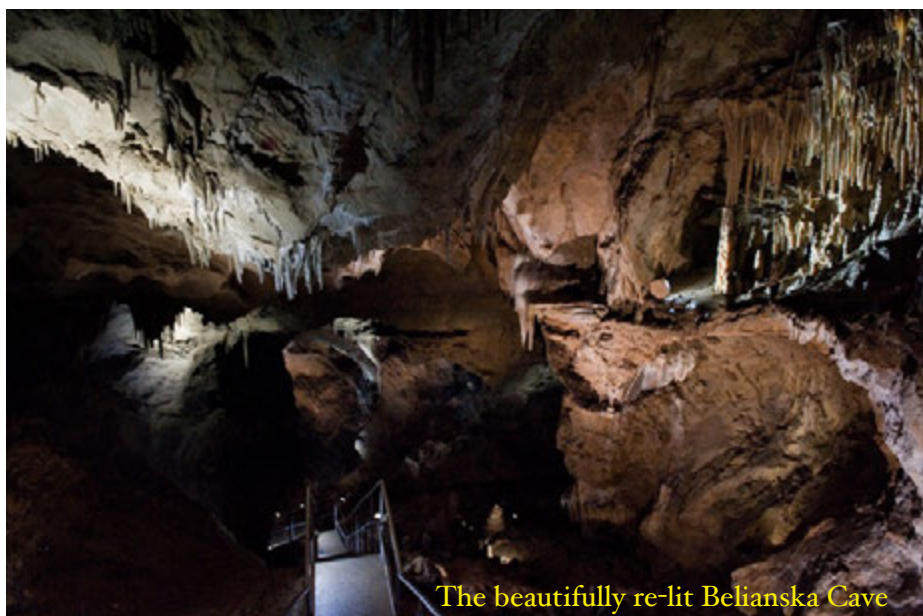
It is a story of how a dream can come true. The idea started with the EU's Structural Funds, where for a programming period of time we were able to write and finance project proposals for improvement of nature protected sites. Since all caves in Slovakia are protected by law, we were, by default, eligible for this programme. The project kicked off in 2012 but it took two more years to start the actual work. Writing about the amount of bureaucracy connected with this type of human activity would be another very, very long story, so let us instead focus on the subject. Two important things needed to improve - the handrails, in some places more than eighty years old, were to be replaced with stainless steel in the length of over 1100m. The other great task ahead was the replacement of the cave lights for something less heat emitting and more energy saving. Both of these tasks are part of the general nature protection standards - eliminating the need for maintenance with steel handrails and reducing the heat and formation of lampenflora, together with saving energy, with the new lighting.

If, in your life, you meet with similar challenges, you may first want to look around you and try to picture what you know and what you have seen elsewhere. And this is where ISCA comes to play. In the fairly recent past, when it had been much easier to take business trips abroad than it is now, I had the opportunity to see many show caves around the world as well as do something that is of at least the same importance; meet likeminded people from the field.

I will not talk too much about the obvious advantages of implementing stainless steel. Even though there are instances when this is not always the best solution, in the case of Belianska cave it certainly was. Rather, I would like to focus on the electrical part of the project, where we have overcome several important milestones. We have changed the voltage from 230V to 24V and we have installed a permanent power source with a diesel generator to supply the cave for the whole day. We have then changed the old lights for LEDs, a common practice nowadays.

But still, something was missing to me. The cave needed something more than just new "hardware." I have seen many very well lit caves — the Zbrasov Aragonite Cave in the Czech Republic and several caves in Australia on my visit back in 2011, to mention a few. In those cases, the cave was lit either by a cave photographer, or an architect with a personal connection to nature. So I spoke to my colleague, a mountaineer, caver and photographer Pavol Stanik, who did a great job with the lighting and was able to illuminate places that were previously left unseen. He played with the lights' colour temperatures, the reflections from the lakes and even with the dynamics of the dripping water. One visit to the cave is truly not enough to see it all.

I then collected some of my experience and ideas gained by "networking" in ISCA. One idea came from a presentation in Bermuda during the ISCA Congress in 2006, where David Summers invited a scenographer or stage designer who started to "perform magic" in the cave. Another idea came from meeting Sasha Chrapko in France in 2008, where he demonstrated a few new possibilities of his Germtec LED lights. All this gave me the notion of connecting everything together in three visual and musical performances in the one suitable place in the cave - The Music Hall. Initially, I had proposed three types of music to be artistically synchronised with the dynamic lights: temple music - since a cave is a



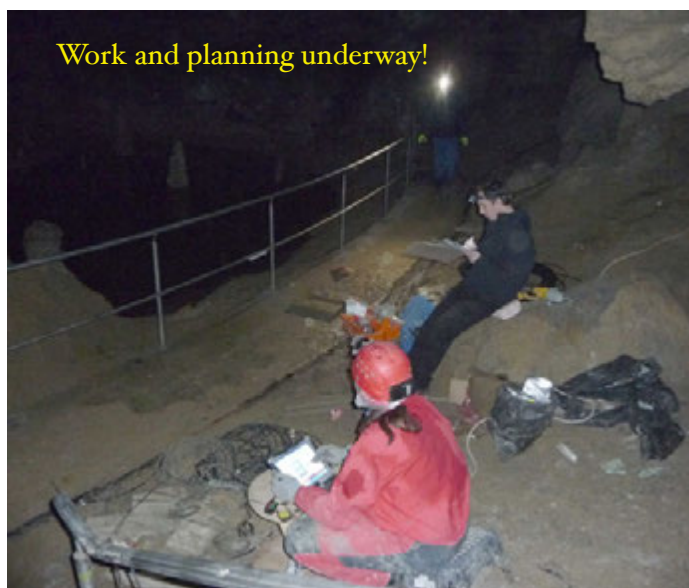
The beautifully re-lit Belianska Cave

kind of a natural temple, folklore music — to feel the country and the place we are in, and a piece of some modern music as the third choice.

In the end, as it often happens, I found the French saying *cherchez la femme* ring true for me. Well, I have to alter it a little, in this case it was *cherchez ma femme*, since it was my wife who had given me the contact for a stage designer Jan Ptacin and, towards the end of the project, the contact for a musical composer Peter Machajdik, who composed a special, original piece of music for the cave. Perhaps it is better not to put certain feelings and impressions into words, but in this case I have to admit that I became speechless when I saw and heard the performance for the first time. But that may just be my personal reaction... On behalf of all the people who helped bring these ideas to life, since it was a whole team of my colleagues and contracted companies, I can say that we did the best we could. We may have not reached the stars, but not for a lack of trying. And now, we have even more challenging ideas to pursue...

So finally, everyone is welcome to come and visit Belianska Cave.

3D MAPPING OF CAVES, A 21ST CENTURY APPROACH

Some ISCA members are no doubt well aware of the technological advances that are changing the way that caves (and other natural and cultural heritage sites) can be surveyed and mapped. In particular, the use of three dimensional imaging has transformed what was once such a time consuming and labour intensive task.

A team of researchers and scientists from the CSIRO (Commonwealth Scientific and Industrial Research Organisation) in Australia have pioneered such work, developing handheld mobile 3D laser scanners and, more recently, a mobile aerial platform known as 'The Bentwing'. These devices build complete 3D maps of environments. This has been successfully trialled at Jenolan and at Wombeyan Caves in NSW, Australia and has produced amazing results including scans within the caves themselves. The same technology has

also been used to scan and digitally map such structures as the Leaning Tower of Pisa and many other heritage liked structures internationally.

As ISCA member Andy Spate noted, this video is truly mind-blowing! The potential applications of the technology are obvious and we can hope to see many more show caves around the world being mapped and preserved through this technology. The technology was even used at Jenolan Caves in early 2014 to create a 'virtual cave experience' for schools, with the Chifley Cave being digitally scanned and recreated as a walk through 3D experience.

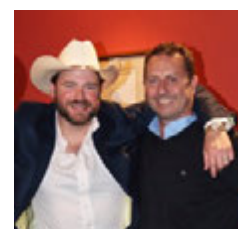

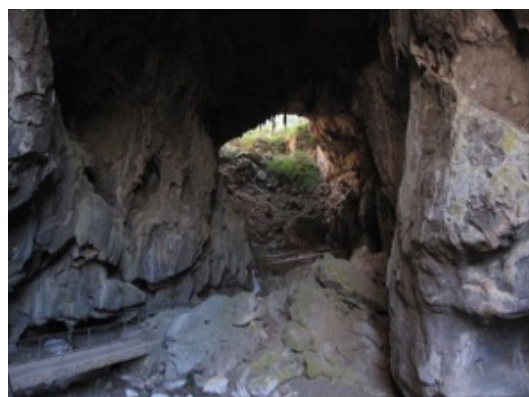
